Providing Services

The OECD Development Centre (the Centre) provides countries with policy advice that is independent, multi-disciplinary, rigorous and tailored to their needs. It brokers informal dialogue, building trust between governments and engaging with a variety of public, private and philanthropic actors. The Centre's Governing Board is open to both OECD and non-OECD countries from all regions and income groups.

Currently, the Centre has membership from 56 countries: 25 from the OECD member countries, and 31 from non-OECD countries. From Asian region, Japan, Korea, China, India, Indonesia, Thailand and Vietnam are the members of the Centre. The thematic topic is diverse, reflecting the needs of the developing countries.

- **Shared economy to leave no one behind:** The Centre advises governments on how to improve social protection, provide more and better jobs, and enhance the contribution of migrants to development. The Centre has two unique datasets; The **Social Institutions and Gender Index (SIGI)** helps them understand and tackle discrimination against women and girls. The **Key Indicators of Informality** shed unprecedented light on the living conditions of informal workers and their families around the world.
- **Strong economy to be competitive and resilient:** The Centre's policy reviews focus on how countries and regions can leapfrog to new technologies, address gaps in the quality and coverage of their infrastructure, improve co-ordination across all levels of governments, and raise financial resources.
- **Green development to success the just transition:** The Centre helps governments navigate those trade-offs and define their own strategic priorities. Its analysis and dialogue activities focus on investments in quality infrastructure, the role of intermediary cities; the specific challenges faced by fossil-fuel producing economies; and the rise of critical raw materials.


Project Achievement in Asia

The Centre's flagship and annual publication on the economic, thematic and country analysis in the region. The 2024 edition's theme is "Growth amid Crisis" and deserved the disaster risk reduction policies. It provided policy recommendations, including finance for DRR, investment and education.



Compendium of Good Practices on Quality Infrastructure 2024 – Building Resilience on Natural Disasters –

The report underscores the critical importance of investing in infrastructure that can withstand the forces of nature. Based on the experiences of diverse nations, including from Japan and Indonesia, it proposes actions to implement the G20 Principles on Quality Infrastructure.
